Teen Raises Funds for Mattie Miracle

Mattie Miracle wants to acknowledge Ryan Goldstein, age 13, for raising funds for the Foundation. Ryan lives in New Jersey and celebrated his Bar Mitzvah on March 12.

Bar Mitzvah is a ceremony that marks the passage of a child into Jewish adulthood. Many synagogues require Bar Mitzvah students to do social action projects, often known as "Mitzvah projects," as part of the preparation to demonstrate commitment to thoughtful Jewish adulthood.

A message from Ryan Goldstein who was awarded the top teen fundraiser at this year's Walk & Family Festival:

I ran a street hockey team event on November 20, to raise **\$3,035** for the Mattie Miracle Cancer Foundation. I chose to do a street hockey event for my Mitzvah project because I love hockey. There were 60 kids who participated and the funds I raised came from this ice hockey event as well as from donating a portion of my Bar Mitzvah gifts.

My grandmother knows Mattie's parents, Peter Brown and Victoria Sardi-Brown, and shared their story with me. In 2013, my grandmother and I drove from New Jersey to Alexandria, Virginia to participate in the annual Mattie Miracle Walk & Family Festival. The experience made an impact on me, so much so that I decided I wanted to get involved with the Foundation's work. Here are the three ways I have supported





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15 Professional Endorsements

Mattie Miracle's vision became a reality on December 23, 2015, when the **Psychosocial Standards of Care for Children with Cancer and Their Families** was published in a special issue of *Pediatric Blood & Cancer*. The three year long, international project, involved 85 health care professionals from 44 institutions across the U.S., Canada, and the Netherlands.

The project resulted in the largest and most comprehensive psychosocial standards research study to date in which 1,217 journal articles were reviewed.

These historic evidence-based standards define what children with cancer and their families must receive to effectively support their psychosocial needs from the time of diagnosis, through survivorship, or end of life and bereavement care. The Standards have been endorsed by 15 professional organizations:

These 15 endorsers represent the vast array of health care professionals who provide psychosocial care (child psychiatrists, child psychologists, educational specialists, pediatric HEM/ONC nurses, pediatric social workers, and HEM/ONC physicians) to children and their families as well as the professional organizations who advocate for comprehensive cancer care. It is important to have these distinguished organizations endorse the Standards as we progress forward in determining ways to strategically implement the Standards at treatment sites around the country.

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
